

### FASHION COLLECTION: 'IGNEOUS'

The name of my collection is IGNEOUS, which is a Latin word meaning 'of fire'. It represents strength, intensity and fierceness. I am inspired by the process of volcanic eruption to its formation into an igneous rock. My silhouettes have been derived from the shape of the mountains. I have used satin georgette to bring out the richness of the colours and have created lot of pleats throughout the collection, as it represents the texture formed by the lava when it cools down. My colour palette includes grey from the rocks, yellow and orange from the magma, red and maroon from the lava. I have tried to resemble the irregular movement from the magma to the lava, as an amber effect in the designs - like the gradation from orange to red or grey to orange.

### FASHION COLLECTION: 'LA DEGEL'

My collection is named LA DEGEL, which is a French term for 'melting down'. The collection revolves around the theme - 'states of matter'. As the name states, the garments I have designed is an amalgamation of structure and flow. The metal Gallium that is one of the rare metals that melts at room temperature inspired me to include fluidity in my garments. Along with silhouettes, I strongly feel that the colours must fit together as pieces in a puzzle and so the colours used are beige, orange and brown, which are from the same family. Fashion is what you buy. Without any embellishments I have used the concept of pleats in diverse forms to enhance the look of the garments. The concept of Crystallisation is also a part of the theme of my collection, which is the process of turning the liquids into solids, forms an integral part and will be used as accessories in my collection.

The silhouettes are boxy and structured because of the solid nature of the sculpture. Asymmetrical cuts are inspired by the curves and the duality of the colours depicts the imbalance. The fabrics I have used are duchess satin, jute and woollen suiting fabric to give the structured effect.














Vaidehi Dharap


Natasha Bakshi

However, my inspiration is moss, which is a primitive plant. Being grown in unusual places, in uneven patterns, these primitive plants caught my attention because they are unwanted and valueless. However, they beautify the area they grow in. Also, they need no external efforts to grow. I consider moss to be imperfect; although they are immensely beautiful. Therefore, my collection revolves around the same elements. Personally being inspired by 50's silhouette, I have used clean and feminine shapes. Considering the rough texture of moss, I have used bullion knots embroidery with velvet threads and 3D cut-danna, beads embroidery in an uneven pattern. The collection is minimalist, simple, sophisticated, but shows the beauty behind imperfection.




### FASHION COLLECTION: 'COSMIC-NAVY'
