












HEERAL SOLANKI

My silhouettes are inspired by traditional Japanese silhouettes with a modern touch and cascades are incorporated in it as they represent graceful lines.

My collection is based on the tales narrated by my grandmother, while I used to be busy drawing during our visits to the park in Konark. The Konark temple dedicated to the Sun God is the inspiration for my collection. Every aspect of my garment reflects the essence of Konark. I've used lkat as the

fabric as they are hand-woven, symbolising the bricks of the temple. It gives a blur feel just like the sculptures on the walls of Konark look in the overexposing sunlight. The colour scheme of the collection is inspired from the soil of Odisha — red, yellow, brown and black. My collection showcases a lot of box pleats taking inspiration from palm leaves, which have been used to record the ancient tales of our culture, and the boxoriented structure of the temple. The chariot structure of Konark influenced my silhouette blended with an A-line style. The nakashi and pita work add to the feel of the structure, which I have translated through different lines. The collection is sophisticated, sustainable and gives hope to the wearer of our age-old traditional textile with a modern edge to it.
